Rabbi Silverstein pioneered with our Whizin Center to create innovative family education programing. And when we launched the Zacharias Frankel College, training Conservative/Masorti rabbis for Europe, again Rabbi Silverstein was there, providing encouragement every step of the way.

On a personal note, I have cherished my private conversations with Alan, his notes and emails, his brilliant presentations, and his abundant optimism when others might want to throw in the towel and despair. He inspires me to reach higher, dig deeper, and try again.

Alan, you have been a blessing to so many of us for so long. May you now reap a rich harvest of סיפוּק and deep joy in all you have so generously planted across the years.
