BOARD ADOPTS BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR

Calls For Outlay Of \$247,711.36; To Continue \$14 Tax Rate

The 1949-50 budget for the Village of Dobbs Ferry which calls for an outlay of \$247,711.36 was adopted on Monday evening following a public hearing on the budget in the Municipal Building. Mayor Danahar presided at the meeting, which was attended by very few residents. The new budget continues the \$14 tax rate per thousand.

Mrs. Chris Crusius read a report from the Park and Recreation Committee on their recommendations for the coming year. A discussion was held on the budget items and there being no objections to the budget as prepared, motion was made by Mr. Guyett, seconded by Mr. Monahan, that the budget be adopted. A resolution was passed that Clerk Margaret Kelly Glennon send out tax bills to all property owners of record at their last known address. They will be

In making the announcement, Mrs. A. L. Haucke, president of the Western Westchester Humane Society, stated "The need for greater emphasis on problems pertaining to animals welfare will be discussed intensively during this period in order to focus attention on the necessity for proper consideration throughout the entire year. Every humane society is dedicated to the task of securing prevention of cruelty to all voiceless living creatures. This job includes proper and prompt attention for all animals which may be sick, injured or otherwise in need of care."

Because animals are essential to the survival of the human race, the humane societies point out that proper care and attention is both humane and economic.

Ferrenz Refuses Assessor Reappointment In Village

Mr. George H. Ferrenz of Walgrove Avenue, Dobbs Ferry, has notified Mayor Walter V. Danahar and members of the Board of Trustees, that he does not wish to accept the appointment as Assessor of the village for the coming year.

Mr. Ferrenz, who has concluded two years as Assessor, was reappointed at the April 18 reorganization meeting of the village. At that meeting, motion was made by Trustees George T. Griffin, seconded by Trustee Howard Guyett that Mr. Ferrenz be reappointed for a term of one year from April 18, 1949 to April 3, 1950, at a salary of \$788 per year.

Mr. Ferrenz's letter to the Mayor on Monday, follows: "Honorable Walter V. Danahar, Mayor, Village of Dobbs Ferry. Dear Mr. Mayor:

I was greatly surprised to learn from Mr. Alley last Tuesday morning that the board had reappointed me to the position of Assessor for the coming year, since I had advised both Mr. Alley and other members of the board prior to the election that I would no longer be interested in this position. PAYROLL AT HOSPITAL UP 1ST QUARTER

Miss Ruby Reports Rise Of \$2,331.01; Reports On Food, Supply Bills

The main increase in expenditures at Dobbs Ferry Hospital still remains in the payroll which has risen \$2,331.01 for the first quarter, according to Miss Ruth A. Ruby, superintendent, in her monthly report to the president and board members of the hospital association.

Food bills have increased \$198.25 for the first three months while the increase for the same period last year was \$480.92 higher than the previous year. General hospital supplies are down \$299.54 and drugs are down \$198.18.

There were 117 patients in the hospital during the past month, Miss Ruby reports, with 1,192 laboratory examinations, 962 days of nursing and 16 ambulance calls.

Total number of patients treated at the hospital during the month were 321 with 117 inpatients, 154 X-rays and 50 outpatients.

Easter Sunday was a quiet day in the hospital as many patients were discharged the previous day. Mrs. Watson B. Hastings donated Easter lily plants for the office and kitchen and cut flowers for the nurses' dining room. Mrs. John A. Querker sent in chocolate Easter egg favors for the patients' trays, and the Brownie Girl Scouts, Group 3, Dobbs Ferry, made nut baskets for the patients and staff.

Richard Hazen, Jefferson Purcell And Mrs. Bernard Davis On Slate

At the school election to be held on Wednesday, the nearly 600 voters of this district who registered personally on Saturday at the Dobbs Ferry High School will elect two trustees out of the three candidates who are running. Richard Hazen and Mrs. Betty Davis are the candidates sponsored by the Non Partisan Committee for the Selection of School Board Candidates, and Jefferson L. Purcell is seeking reelection on the school board without the endorsement of this group.

The polls will be open from four until nine o'clock on Wednesday, May 4, at the Dobbs Ferry High School.

The exact registration on Saturday was 579, which is about four times that of last year when the election was uncontested. This year's election is the first contested election since the Non-Partisan Committee came into existence in 1946.

The personal registration was supervised by School District Clerk H. Victor Burlock, who reports that more than half of the total number of voters had their name placed on the registry between six and nine o'clock.
