

Troop 35 Displays Flag Sent By 'Brother Troop' In Holland

DOBBS FERRY—Boy Scout Troop 35 today are taking pride in displaying a Dutch Scout flag, gift from its adopted "brother troop," Eindhoven (Holland) Troop 7, De Heidejagers, in appreciation of uniforms, clothing and camping equipment sent in the last year.

The flag, which measures three feet by five feet, was shown for the first time at Wednesday night's troop meeting. It immediately prompted Troop 35 Scouts to contribute toward the purchase of a Boy Scouts of America flag to be shipped to Holland by air-mail in time for Christmas.

The troop also has received a postcard from the Eindhoven unit carrying the signatures of all members of the Dutch troop and the words: "Greetings to the Boys of Troop 35."

Adopted Last Fall

The Dutch troop was adopted last Fall following word from a Netherlands West Indies police officer that Eindhoven Troop 7 was in great need of uniforms and equipment. Troop 35 boys have been in frequent touch with the Netherlands Scouts ever since and have shipped more than 200 pounds of Scout equipment, uniforms, clothing and literature.

Scoutmaster Don Hassell announced six boys will seek eight advancement awards at the troop's second board of review to be conducted in Wilde House Dec. 7. James McLean and Robert Guyett will be up for First Class, David Williams for Second Class, and Guyett, Donald Swift, Martyn Bastow and Donald Paty for merit badges.
