We started just 17 years ago with a few members meeting in the cellar of Village Hall. With growth, we finally built the building which now stands as our memorial to those veterans who will never again be with us.

As Dobbs Ferry passes into the last quarter of its first century, we believe that the old timers are happy to see that the new veterans are stepping in to carry the ball until there is no longer a need for veteran's organizations.

We salute Dobbs Ferry and hope that we will be able to do our small share in its growth as the years pass on.

For devotion to community, state and nation is one of our most solemn pledges.

ARDSLEY WILL ENGAGE FIVE NEW TEACHERS

Mrs. Belmont, Mrs. Parsons, Mrs. Morgan And Miss O'Donnell Quit

When the Ardsley School reopens after the Summer recess on Wednesday, Sept. 8, there will be five new teachers on the High School faculty, four of which are replacing teachers who this week handed their resignations to the Board of Education, and one new teacher, who will instruct a section of Grade Three, Mr. Arthur W. Silliman, has announced.

The four teachers, Mrs. Eleanor Belmont, Mrs. Constance Parsons, Mrs. Helen Morgan and Miss Margaret O'Donnell, have all been invited to remain at Ardsley, but for personal or family reasons, find it necessary to make a change. The new teacher will be Miss Ruth Hurbut who has been teaching in the grades at Lowville, N. Y., for the past six years. She is a graduate of Potsdam State Teachers College and has been a model teacher in the practice school on recommendation of her superintendent.

Miss Cornelia Pattenon who received her Bachelor of Science degree from Keuka College and her M.A. from Teachers College of Columbia, has taught at Woodhull, N. Y., and at the Vestal N. Y. Central School. She will succeed Mrs. Parsons who had headed the commercial department for the past 16 years. Mrs. Parsons was graduated from Ardsley High School and earned her B.A. at State Teachers College, Columbia. After teaching two years in New Jersey she returned to Ardsley 16 years ago where she has continued to furnish a business foundation second to none.

Mrs. Ruth Howes will head the Home Making Department at the Ardsley School and will succeed Mrs. Morgan, who is leaving to take up residence on Long Island, where she has accepted a position in Great Neck. Mrs. Howes, the new teacher, is resigning as head of the Home Making Department at Brewster High School to come to Ardsley. Her husband is senior master at the Harvey School in Hawthorne.

Miss Dorothy Pelda will replace Mrs. Belmont who is leaving to be with her husband upstate. Miss Pelda has just completed teaching English in Monticello and is a resident of White Plains. She earned her Master's Degree at New York University.

Miss Evelyn Hallenbeck, who is a graduate of the Crane School of Music with a background of camp and choral group leadership, will start her duties here to succeed Miss O'Donnell, the latter of whom is leaving to enter a religious career. Miss Hallenbeck was a classmate of Miss O'Donnell's at Potsdam State Teachers College.
