

Senate Votes To Continue State Institutes

ALBANY, (AP)—The state's five technical institutes of Applied Arts and Sciences, created in 1946, today were headed for another year of operation on a temporary basis.

The Senate passed without dissent last night a bill continuing the two-year, post-high school institutes until Aug. 31, 1953.

The Assembly was expected to concur.

The institutes are located at New York City, Buffalo, White Plains, Binghamton and Utica.

The Senate also unanimously passed and sent to the Assembly bills that would:

Create 1,200 more college scholarships for veterans, which are worth \$350-a-year for four years, and extend provisions of the scholarship law to cover military service until July 1, 1953.

Continue for another year, until Feb. 15, 1953, Lieutenant Governor Frank C. Moore's temporary commission on school building need, financing and construction.

Herman Files Annual Report

WHITE PLAINS—The annual report of County Attorney Harry G. Herman was filed yesterday with the Board of Supervisors.

In it, Mr. Herman detailed the activities of his office, including preparation and consultation on legislation, appearances in court on behalf of the county, and acting as an adviser to various departments of the county.

Claims totaling \$914,338 were disposed of during the year, with 34 cases being settled or resulting in verdicts against the county for a total of \$783,856, all of which was covered by insurance. The county won verdicts in 12 cases involving \$130,482. At the start of this year 61 cases involving \$1,027,188 were pending.

Humane Society Opposes Animal Experiments' Bill

WHITE PLAINS—The Board of Directors of the Central Westchester Humane Society, 40 Depot Plaza, yesterday voted its opposition to the Hatch-McCall bill, on which a public hearing is to be held Feb. 14 in the State Senate Chamber at Albany.

The bill, the directors point out, seeks to compel all humane societies having contracts for pound work to surrender, when requisitioned by the Commissioner of Health, unlicensed, unwanted or unclaimed cats and dogs to laboratories and institutions for the purpose of animal experimentation.

The six Westchester Humane Societies, the Yonkers Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, the New York State Humane Association and similar organizations are opposed to the bill on the grounds that it is a violation of the principles on which they were founded—the protection of animals from cruelty and suffering, the Central Westchester Humane group points out.

\$105 Worth Of Goods Stolen At A & P

DOBBS FERRY—The Police Department is investigating the theft of 22 parcels of merchandise early Saturday morning from the sidewalk loading area of the A & P Super Market at 11-13 Ashford Avenue.

The theft was reported yesterday to police and investigation by Sergeant Dominick DeMichele revealed that a forced entry had been made into the store of the Palmer Electric Company, which adjoins the A & P. Nothing was taken from the Palmer store.

The stolen A & P merchandise was valued at \$105.

Eighth Grade Pupils Visit Philipse Castle

Supervisors Delay Move On N.E. Thruway

WHITE PLAINS—The Board of Supervisors will give further study to a proposal that the County enter an agreement with the State to turn over land acquired for the Pelham-Park Chester Parkway for use in construction of the proposed New England Thruway.

Supervisor Richard H. Levett of White Plains, chairman of the Parkways, Highways and Thruways Committee, presented a report in which he stated the proposed agreement is a follow through on commitments already made. He added that state officials have agreed to confer with local authorities concerning the route, which has not yet been set, and other details before any work is done.

It was on Mr. Levett's suggestion that action on the report was deferred.

The committee studied the matter in response to a letter from County Executive Herbert C. Gerlach, who informed the board that the state wished such an agreement.

The Legislation Committee will make a study of a proposed change in the election law to allow use of a V check mark on ballots in addition to the presently valid cross.

Supervisor Alice Young of New Rochelle said the measure has been introduced by Senator Frank S. McCullough of Rye and Assemblyman Harold D. Toomey of Mount Vernon, at the request of New Rochelle residents, who pointed out that 350 ballots cast in a recent primary there were thrown out because a check mark had been used. She asked that the committee investigate the proposal and report to the board.

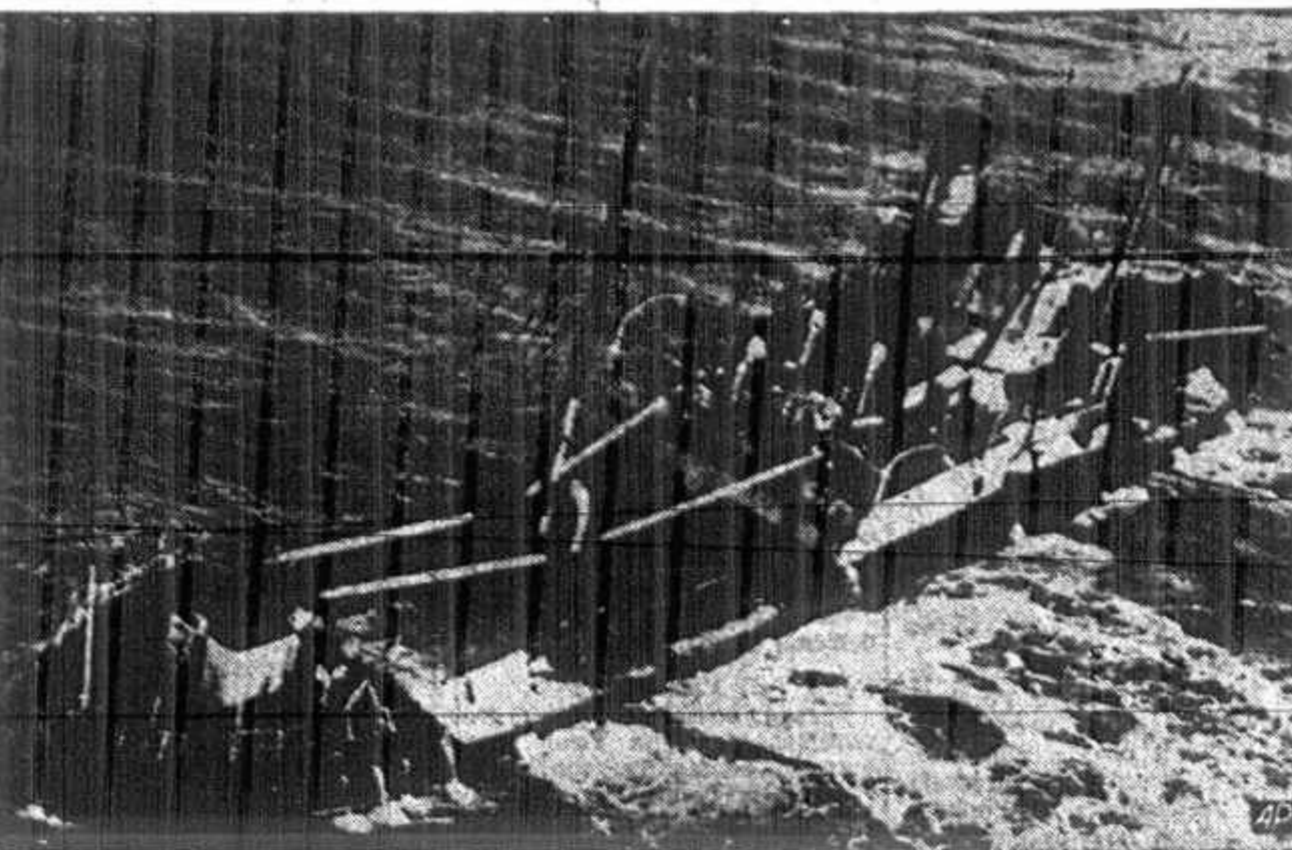

Park And Recreation Merger Voted Down By Supervisors

WHITE PLAINS—The Board of Supervisors yesterday afternoon voted down suggestions for a possible merger of the Park and Recreation commissions and for the formation of a joint maintenance division for the Park Commission and Public Works Departments.

The action was based upon a report made by the Budget and Legislation committees which have studied suggestions made two years ago by the then Budget Director William B. Folger.

The committees held there was no evidence that substantial savings or economies would result from the merger of the commissions, and pointed out their activities are of considerably different nature.

In connection with the suggestion for a combined maintenance setup, the report states that both departments presented opposition. The committees find that savings would not be substantial because of the different nature of the work done by each, but suggests that it might be worthwhile to arrange a pool of personnel to be available to both departments.

State Hopes For Enough Steel To Finish Thruway In 1954

ALBANY (AP)—Despite the current steel shortage, the State Thruway Authority still has high hopes of completing its cross-state superhighway in 1954.

The three-member agency told the Legislature and Governor Dewey yesterday the only threat now to its construction schedule was a "further serious deterioration of the international situation."

But it said it believed that "steel will be available by the first quarter of 1953 for all thruway requirements."

To Receive Bids on Bridge

The authority also said it would receive bids next week for the first construction work on the proposed \$50 million bridge across the Hudson River between Nyack and Tarrytown. It said actual work should start shortly thereafter.

The huge span will be "well under construction during 1952," the authority said. Completion is expected in 1954.

The first contract, to cost about \$5.2 million, will cover foundations and piers for the first 7,000 feet of the structure on the western side of the river.

The annual report and the authority's second—said "good progress" had been made in 1951 on the cross-state highway. It said 41 miles of the 535-mile route had been opened to traffic and another 109 miles would be under contract by March 31.

Adoption of a fee system for users of the super highway would mean the "entire \$500 million thruway bond issue could be paid off in 25 years," the report said.

The fee system was drawn by a New York City firm of consulting engineers. It proposed a \$10 annual fee for unlimited use of the highway by automobiles registered in New York State, a 7-cent-a-mile charge for out-of-state cars or those not holding the annual permits, and higher rates for big trucks and buses.

The authority also urged that the Legislature approve bills to permit control of billboards along the thruway's right-of-way.

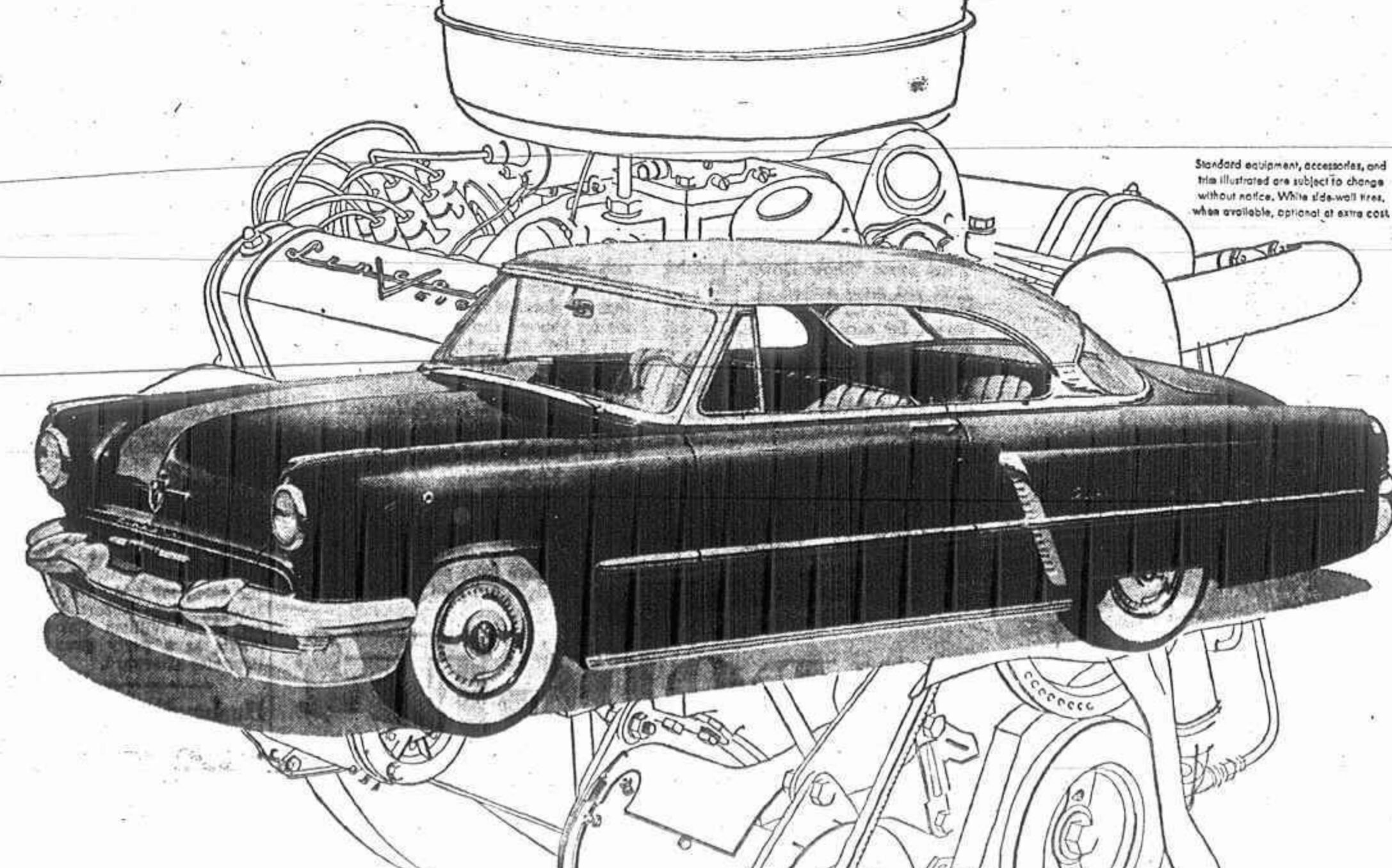
