for one reason. It is the center of a small, isolated rice-growing area surrounded by mountains. The Red food supply, now very short, will be helped somewhat by taking these rice fields.

In all this, however, there is still no answer to the really big question: Are the Communists capable of launching a major offensive against the main French position in the delta during this Winter ighting season? Have the Chinese Reds been able to spare enough resources from Korea to build up their Viet-Minh allies to the offen-

sive level? This is worth watching carefully, for if no Viet-Minh offensive appears it will he a pretty-clear indication that Red China is really feeling the Korean drain. The military situation in Northern Indochina will not remain indefinitely

in its present uneasy halance. Will the Reds launch a major offensive against the delta? That is their only hope of a substantial success in Indochina. If it does not come, or if it comes only to be defeated, we can begin to speak in terms of a turning tide in Southeast Asia.

# **Murder Pistol** Search Pushed

An intensive search for the pistol believed to have been used in the fatal shocting of Emil Miessmer Tuesday was begun in the vicinity of the victim's home at 26 24-hour-a-day vigil against a pos-Longmeadow Road this morning by the Auxiliary Police Corps and volunteers of the Yonkers Police

The search party is combing woods within a half mile radius of the Miessmer home. Expended cartridges found at the scene of the shooting have led police to believe they are searching for a .45 caliber automatic pistol.

The hunt for the pistol began at 9 o'clock this morning, with gw almost 100 Auxiliary Policemen, under the direction of Col. Arthur E. Chambers, and about 50 regular police volunteers taking part. Among the officers leading the police volunteers were Deputy Public Safety Commissioner James E. McCue, Capt. Joseph Dominico of the Detective Bureau, Capt. James Hollis of the Second Precinct, and Sgt. Frank Ciliberti.



Police said there were numerous stab marks on her face as well as contusions of her entire body probably as the result of a beating.

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
