WASHINGTON (AP) - Wholesale prices as measured by the government declined two-tenths of 1 per cent during the week ended Nov. 4.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said its index reached 110.1 per cent of the 1947-49 average. Farm products and processed foods declined fractionally, with lower prices recorded for fresh eggs and meats. Meat fruits. prices fell 1.7 per cent during the week and were 11 per cent lower than in September.






