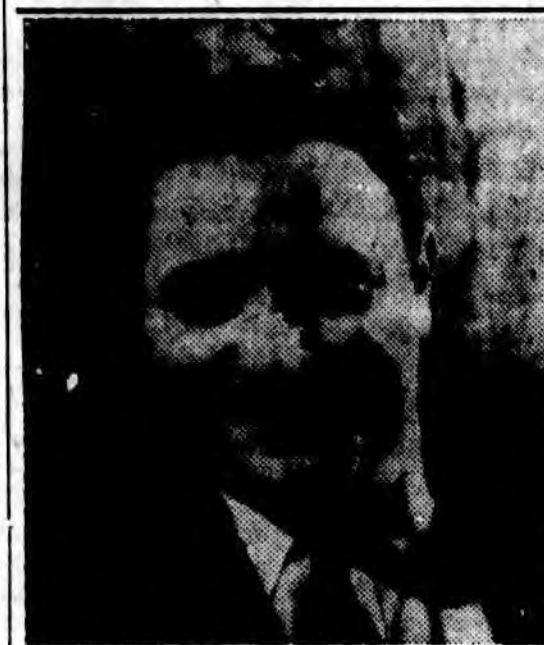
J. Sonkin Named To Head \$250,000 Building Fund For Hebrew Center

Jack Sonkin of 160 Lincoln Avenue, Hastings, has been named chairman of the building fund campaign to raise the necessary \$250,000 for the construction of a new Greenburgh Hebrew Center in Dobbs Ferry, it was announced today.

His appointment was made public by Joseph Linzer, Hastings president; and Philip Scherl, Irvington, who is chairman of the Center's board of trustees.

A 10-week drive to raise the \$250,000 to begin the building of the Center was announced a few days ago by the board. It is the first such campaign undertaken by this growing congregation.

A prominent leader in his community, Mr. Sonkin is president of Proressive Electronics, Inc., 41 Hudson Street, Yonkers. His firm

is one of the leading manufacturers of television tubes in the East, with plants in Yonkers and New Jersey.

Mr. Sonkin is also a practicing attorney, a graduate of the Columbia University Law School. He practiced law for many years in New York City and later with distinction with the airforce in Europe during World War II. He is married and the father of two children. He has been a leader in the Jewish community here for a number of years, having served as the Center's president in 1949 and 1950.

Founded in 1947, the Greenburgh Hebrew Center first met in the Dobbs Ferry American Legion Hall. A year later, they purchased and remodeled a large residence at 515 Broadway to serve as both Synagogue and social center.

"We are now very much in the position of a mother whose eight year old son is still wearing his baby shoes," Mr. Sonkin said. "We are growing so rapidly that I expect our current membership to

double in the next few years."

The new Center will be built immediately behind the present structure which is situated on Broadway between Belden and Sherman Avenues.

Rabbi Sydney Shanken, spiritual leader of the Congregation who was installed last August, has been preparing plans for substantial additions to the educational and worship facilities of the Center, Mr. Sonkin said.
