Local Schools Reopened With Enrollment Of 1452 Faculty Meeting Is Held

126 Children Enter Kindergarten Six-Double Session Grades

BRINKMAN SPEAKS

Superintendent Spoke On "Business Of Education" On Tuesday

The Dobbs Ferry Public Schools reopened for the Fall semester yesterday morning and welcomed 1,452 pupils to classes, 128 of which entered the six kindergarten classes.

Loren Evory, principal of the Elementary School reported an enrollment of 839 and William Z. Lindsey, principal of the High School, reported 613 students are enrolled in the High School.

One hundred and twenty-eight students entered the kindergarten classes, three of which are held in the morning and three of which are held in the afternoon. One of the morning and one of the afternoon class sessions are held in the Greenburgh Hebrew Center, due to lack of space in the Elementary School.

Children throughout the school were presented with the Dobbs Ferry School handbook, which gives parents and guardians all regulations to be followed in courses of study, sports, illness, etc.

Mrs. Anderson, Clerk of the Elementary School, reported that forty-four students had transferred from the Elementary School to the Sacred Heart Annex Parochial School, students who will attend Our Lady of Victory School in Tarrytown for this year.

At the combined faculty meeting of the Dobbs Ferry public school teachers on Tuesday, Dr. Albert R. Brinkman, the new superintendent, addressed the group on "The Business of Education."

Dr. Suerken Asks Missions Board For Aid In Knoxville

Two church executives today called upon leaders of the home mission program of the United Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., to find new ways to minister to families in the inner city.

The speakers, Dr. Kenneth C. Neigh of New York, and Dr. Ernst H. Suerken of Dobbs Ferry, addressed the opening session of the National Staff of the denomination's Board of National Missions. The 200-member staff is holding its five-day annual meeting on the campus of Knoxville College, Knoxville, Tenn.

Dr. Neigh, recently elected general secretary of the Board of National Missions, told the policy-making group that one of the persistent causes of delinquency today is the absence of any beliefs and values among children and teen-agers.

"It is to this problem that we are best equipped to address ourselves," he said.

"One of the implications of proclaiming the gospel," Dr. Neigh continued, "is that we can instill values and this means that we can no longer sit by and worry as to what people think of us when in point of fact it is our task to provide them with the bases upon which they can make value judgments out of life, and society, and their fellow men."

Dr. Neigh, who was until July 1 the chief administrative officer for the United Presbyterian Synod of Michigan, went on to say that missionaries in the inner city should not limit their work to families in areas where housing and behavior problems are critical.

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ROBT. STANTON ON ALFRED U. FUND APPEAL

Local Man Attended Executive Meeting Of Alumni Last Weekend

Plans to promote organization of Alfred University Alumni Groups in Europe, the Far East, the Middle East and India were drawn up by the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association at a recent meeting held at the Treadway Inn, Cahandaigua, New York.

There are 125 foreign alumni of Alfred University in forty-two foreign countries, the committee noted in making preparations to back formation of Geographic Groups to serve alumni overseas.

The members of the executive committee also voted at the August 29 meeting to activate during the coming year nine new Geographic Groups for alumni in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Miami, Tampa-St. Petersburg, West Palm Beach, Hamden and Hartford, Conn., Long Island and in Westchester County, and North New Jersey. 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Planning Board Will Consider Rezoning To Erect 92 Houses

Owner Willing To Set Aside Three Plots For Village Recreation

A Special Meeting and Public Hearing will be held on Tuesday evening, September twenty-second at eight o'clock at the Municipal Building to consider rezoning for subdivision plans of Saw Mill Heights, Inc., for development of the old twenty-five acre Arnstein Estate east of Ashford Avenue, it has been announced by the Planning Board. Saw Mill Heights, Inc. will be represented by Dante S. Alberi, Mount Vernon attorney.

The meeting and hearing has been called by the Planning Board of which Henry C. Klein is chairman.

The project provides for dividing the tract into building plots from 7,500 to more than 10,000 square feet. About 92-one family dwellings are to be located on the property which will have access driveways connecting with Price Street and South Field Avenue. In reaching the latter, the planners will endeavor to obtain a permanent easement from the Westchester County Park Commission to permit a satisfactory approach over land skirting to Saw Mill River Parkway which will make a connection between South Field Avenue and the development an acceptable one.

AAA Warns On Extra Caution On Driving As Schools Are Re-opened

At no time of the year is there a greater need for caution when driving than during the school reopening period.

In the first few weeks of September, several million children in the metropolitan New York area start the annual trek back to school. Fresh from vacation, they are apt to forget the rules of safe walking and playing — dart into the street after a thrown ball — or dash across an intersection to greet a classmate. Many school children will be "small fry" attending classes for the first time.

To dramatize the need for greater safety, the Automobile Club of New York in 1946 launched its "School's Open" campaign. They have been conducted every year since then. Their effectiveness may be gauged in statistics which show a 48 per cent reduction in traffic fatalities among children from five to fourteen years of age in the

state since 1945. This is in spite of a 106 per cent increase in motor vehicle registrations during the same period. This year, the automobile club will display some 25,000 colorful safety posters at all major intersections and street crossings in the metropolitan area. Another 150,000 "School's Open" bumper strips will be distributed for use on motor vehicles. Everyone can help the cause for increased safety. Being extra alert behind the wheel of a car is one way. Another is to set a good example for the "young folk" by heeding all the pedestrian safety rules. Still another is to make sure youngsters have truly learned the meaning of safety. But the need for safety-consciousness should not end in October, when the posters come down and the official campaign period ends. Increased traffic safety, particularly as it affects our children, should be a never-ending objective.
