

Hudson Heights Talk On Fallout

The effects of thermonuclear explosions will be discussed at a meeting of the Hastings Hudson Heights Association in the Municipal Building next Tuesday, December 5 at 8:15 p.m. The public is invited.

The speaker will be Dr. Richard S. Benua, of Pelham, a member of the Scientists' Committee for Radiation Information. Dr. Benua is a staff member of the Sloan Kettering Memorial Insti-

Association members will also hear a presentation on Westchester County's offer to the village of Hastings-on-Hudson, for \$1, of approximately 30 acres of park land between the Saw Mill River Parkway and the Saw Mill River Road. The Association's Board of Governors has urged the village Board of Trustees to accept the offer.

Dr. Benua will take up the seven types of hazards that would folow a thermonuclear explosion, including blast damage, fallout and firestorm. He will also discuss the effectiveness of shelters against the various hazards.

In announcing the meeting the Association's Board of Governors notes two local factors that give Dr. Benua's talk added significance:

The Board of Education has announced plans for a public hearing on a proposal to build a shelter in the new elementary school, and Civil Defense officials have reported that Hastings is within the general target area of an enemy strike.

"While the subject is not sidered," the Association's Board said. "We hope a factual presentation of the effects of a thermonuclear explosion will help Hastings people reach more informed opinions on the question."

The aim of the Committee is to provide information on radiation and nuclear technology. Under its charter, the Committee does not endorse particular programs of action or political positions.
