Edmund W. Baker, 59, a former Dobbs Ferry resident, died May 13 at Northern Westchester Hospital in Mount Kisco. Mr. Baker lived in Mount Kisco for the last two years. Born April 6, 1924, in Brooklyn, he attended St. John's University and Columbia University. He was a financial advisor for Saudi Parsons Ltd. based in Pasadena, Calif. He was a member of St. Francis Church in Mount Kisco and belonged to the Moses Taylor Jr. American Legion Post there. He served with the U.S. Army in Europe during World War II. Surviving are his wife, Jean Crawford Hay Baker, of Mount Kisco; two sons, Edmund Hay Baker, of New Paltz, N.Y., and Douglas Ian Baker, of Mount Kisco; a daughter, Ellen Crawford Baker, of White Plains; and a sister, Rita Sullivan, of Florida.

He also belonged to the Masons and the 25 Club of Yonkers. Mr. Masouras had a life-long interest in conservation and was a recipient of the Bob Ohlman Award of the Putnam County Fish and Game Association, for his efforts in conservation. He was also a founding member of "The Shack," a fishing organization that raised money over the years to send boys to state conservation camps. Of All Faiths

If you've seen a sign outside South Presbyterian Church and haven't been able to understand it, that's because you don't read Korean.

The sign says **Dobbs Ferry Korean Presbyterian Church**. The Korean congregation has been meeting Sunday afternoons in South Church since the beginning of July, 1982. They have a temporary pastor at present but expect to have a regular pastor in a couple of months. In the Korean Sunday School, the children are taught in English by an American teacher, since they don't speak Korean.

Pastor Joseph Gilmore says he and his congregation are very happy to have the Korean group sharing their space with them. It's a great relationship.

Another ethnic congregation, the **Chinese Community Church of Westchester**, has been worshipping in the chapel of the **First Reformed Church** since the beginning of May and hopes to make the Hastings church its home for some time to come.

The group met for six years in a Presbyterian church in White Plains. Now it has applied for membership in the Reformed Church in America (RCA). The new congregation consists of 30 families with 60-70 adults (average age 30-33) and 15-20 children. Most of the adults came to the United States from Taiwan or Hong Kong for graduate study. Many of them are now computer scientists.

While the members all speak good English, their services are held in Mandarin, the official Chinese language. For those born in this country who don't know Mandarin, a translator is always present, and earphones are available.

Dr. Joseph Wu, coordinator of the Chinese church, says that his group is very happy with their new facilities and the warmth of the members of First Church. Pastor Jim Beukelman is glad to have an ecumenical and biracial emphasis in his church. He cites the words of the hymn "In Christ there is no East or West." The two congregations held a joint reception after their respective services on Sunday, May 15, and they will get together again at a picnic on June 12.

A celebration of shared communion among Lutheran and Episcopal churches was held at **St. Barnabas Episcopal Church** in Ardsley, on Saturday, May 21. Leading the services were the Rev. Robert J. Godley, of St. Barnabas, the Rev. William C. Larson of Dobbs Ferry Lutheran, the Rev. A. Dawson Teague of Zion Episcopal, D.F., the Rev. William J. Damrow of St. Mark's Lutheran, and the Rev. Donald R. Cutler of St. Joseph of Arimathea, Episcopal, the last two both from Elmford. All the clergy wore white surplices and bright red stoles. The Dobbs Ferry Lutheran senior choir in black gowns under the direction of Rosalie Marshall. Richard J. Lorino of St. Barnabas was at the organ.

After discussing the matter for several years, the Unitarians who meet on Old Jackson Ave.,

Hastings, voted at their annual meeting on May 11 to change their name to the **First Unitarian Society of Westchester**. As their minister, the Rev. Bettye A. Doty told this writer: "Each fellowship, church, or society may vote on their own name and bylaws." The members of her group decided they feel more comfortable with the term "society" than with "church."
