Arthur grew up in Queens, where his parents were always deeply involved in synagogue life. His family moved to Maryland when he was 15 and quickly became active in the local Jewish community. Their community was starting a new synagogue, and they became part of the effort, eventually serving in its leadership. During that time, their four sons were born, and the rabbi gently persuaded them to educate the boys at the Charles E. Smith Jewish Day School.

Arthur and Vicki feel fortunate to have found their way to the Huntington Jewish Center when they moved to Syosset in 1990. They became aware of HJC through Rabbi Neil Kurshan's daughter, who was a classmate of their son at the Schechter School of Long Island. The rabbi offered them High Holiday tickets, and after attending on a few more Shabbatot, Vicki and Arthur were moved by the warm sense of community and the outreach. They joined HJC. Arthur joined a few committees and soon found himself assuming chairmanship of the ritual committee and joining the Board of Trustees. Since then, Arthur has served the HJC community as vice president, treasurer, trustee, webmaster, and chairman of several committees, including, security, finance, professional structure, theater, and cemetery.

Arthur worked in Washington, DC, as a chemist for the Army Corps of Engineers, eventually serving as Chief of Science and Technology for the US Environmental Protection Agency's national safe drinking water program. In New York, Arthur is in the wire and cable business. Vicki has a distinguished career in Jewish early childhood education. She is the Director of Early Childhood Education at Temple Beth-El of Great Neck and a past president of the National Jewish Early Childhood Network. Vicki currently serves as the President of the Huntington Jewish Center.
